Heritage Alliance Receives Grant from Humanities Tennessee

The Heritage Alliance has just been awarded a grant by Humanities Tennessee to create the exhibit, "Far Away and Close to Home: The Art and Words of Author/Illustrator Rhea Wells." The project is a partnership with the McKinney Center who will host the exhibit. It will be co-curated with help from the Reece Museum at ETSU

Rhea Wells (1891-1962) was a native of Jonesborough who is best remembered as an author and illustrator of children's books published in the early twentieth century when the field was first developing. His titles include Zeke the Raccoon, An American Farm, Beppo the Donkey, and Allie the Camel, to name a few.

The McKinney Center, Mary B. Martin Program for the Arts, and the Washington County Public Library will be working with the Heritage Alliance to also develop a series of art and literature workshops and

Wells' early life in Washington County influenced his books, along with his extensive travels to Europe and Africa. Wells was a passionate advocate for art and literature, and he endowed the Jonesborough library upon his death. The exhibit and its programs will take place in early 2018. World War I decorative medal from the Museum's collection


To honor this year's centennial the United ofStates' entry into World War I, an exhibit of military artifacts display on Jonesborough & Washington County History Museum. The exhibit will debut over Memorial Day Weekend.

5,963 Washington County men registered for the draft, but only 1,168 ever wore a uniform. 569 actually served overseas. Fifty-six men from Jonesborough served, and 19 of them died in battle or from disease. The exhibit will share quotes from letters sent home to anxious families, as well as articles from the *Herald & Tribune* that covered issues on the home front, such as rationing and the Sedition Act which outlawed criticism of the United States government. The exhibit will also cover the flu pandemic of 1918 and its impact on Washington County.

History Happy Hour Offers New Programs

The Chester Inn's new "History Happy program, Hour" got off to a great start on March 23 when more than 40 people gathered to hear about the life of First Lady Eliza Johnson. following Happy Hour presentations are scheduled for the coming months - all with a start time of 6:30. Programs are held in the Chester Inn State Historic Site and Museum.

- <u>June 22</u>: Marlin Curnutt of Walters State History Department will speak about Jackie Robinson and his role as spark for the Civil Rights Movement.
- <u>July 20</u>: Dr. Colin Baxter, Professor emeritus of East Tennessee State University, will speak about James Baxter Bean, a descendant of Tennessee's first



permanent settler of European origin, and famed Civil War physician. The Heritage Alliance will also unveil a very unique new artifact in the Heritage Alliance's collection that is related to the Bean family. • August 10: Blaine Schubert, with the East Tennessee State University Geosciences Department/Gray Fossil Site at ETSU, will speak about the natural history of the East Tennessee region.

Washington County Archives - What's Inside?

The Washington County Archives are now open for business in their new home, the former First National Bank Building at 103 West Main Street. Over the next few newsletters, we'll offer some interesting examples of the information they have available.

Wills are one type of document included in the archive. These take many different forms, from formal documents drafted by an attorney, to hand-written on cardboard or even the back of a calendar. One of the most interesting (see photo) is on a piece of paper the size of a playing card, the will of Lula Baxter, written in 1934.


Documents in the archives are historic records of Washington County. Some were created by the State of Franklin, and a few even date back to British rule. These include:

Court Records: from Chancery Court, Superior Court, Circuit Court, and County Court (case files, docket books and minutes) 1777 up to 2009,


Deeds: 1997-present, Election Records: 1832-1949, Estate Inventories: 1778-2006, Justice of the Peace Records: 1779-1963, Marriage Records: 1787-1990, Tax Books: 1778-2005,

Wills: 1779-1959

Heritage Alliance Wins Four Awards for Original Programs

Graveyard Tours Set to Resume for 2017

Tours of Rocky Hill and College Hill, Jonesborough's historic cemeteries, will resume on Memorial Day weekend. The tours will be offered every Saturday at 2:30. Tickets may be purchased at the Chester Inn Museum. The cost for a tour is \$3, although those who want to attend the cemetery tour and another tour option may buy a combo ticket for \$7.

Burials at Rocky Hill cemetery are believed to date back to the turn of the 18th century. Many of Jonesborough's most colorful historical figures are buried there. The cemetery was regularly used for burials through the early 1900s. College Hill Cemetery was chartered in 1890 by the Colored Peoples Cemetery Society.

Most tours are given by "Graveyard" Gordon Edwards, who has done extensive research and spearheaded a significant amount of restoration work on the cemeteries and their markers. On some tours this year, he will be joined by other "characters" who will portray individuals found in the cemetery.

Volunteer Spotlight: Janice Hammett

It has taken a while to shine our spotlight on one of the Heritage Alliance's most long-time volunteers, but worth the wait. Janice Hammett's support of historic preservation in Jonesborough precedes the Heritage Alliance, dating back to the Civic Trust, the town's first historic preservation organization.

"I grew up in Jonesborough," says Janice, "back when there were no traffic lights. After college, I returned to become a librarian at the city library when it was located in the Chester Inn." The town library was in the Chester Inn from the 1960's to the late 1980's. Back then there was an elevated brick planter across the front sidewalk of the Chester Inn that contained a flower garden. The far end of the basement floor was the children's book area

In the late 1980's she and her family moved to Morganton, North Carolina, for about a returning decade. to the Jonesborough area in 1998. Until her retirement, she was a librarian at the Johnson City Library. Now she has come full circle and is back again at the Chester Inn as a docent. answering visitor's questions.

When asked about the biggest changes she has seen Jonesborough during the years, she points out the local leaders who were visionaries by choosing to save and preserve the historic downtown buildings, and in the 1970's, to bury all the utility lines in order to bring back even more historic character to the town During her years as a librarian there were not nearly as many tourists as today - that the

continued growth of the Storytelling Festival has really brought people into town.

Reflecting upon her job as a docent, Janice says, "I didn't have to study the history of the Chester Inn because I lived it." We all enjoy that she shares that history with us.
