2020 is a Year of Anniversary Celebrations

In this line of work we are always cognizant of the past. This year in particular there are many national and regional anniversaries of note that are occurring. While we are looking ahead towards another year of organizational growth and history -based programming, it is important to step back and recognize several important milestones.

Nationally, this is the 100th anniversary of victory in the Women's Suffrage movement. Tennessee became the 36th state (and last state needed) to ratify the 19th Amendment, which opened up voting rights for American women. The struggle would continue to ensure protections of that right for African

American women for decades to follow, but this was a landmark advancement in the political enfranchisement of women.

Another anniversary with national implications is exceptionally rele-

vant to Jonesborough. This year marks the 200th anniversary of *The Emancipator*, Elihu Embree's abolitionist paper. Although it was only in production for a few months, it had a national subscription and is considered to be the first publication dedicated solely to the abolition of slavery in the United States.

Heritage Alliance and Chester Inn Win TAM Awards of Excellence

The Heritage Alliance and the Chester Inn State Historic Site and Museum received two Awards of Excellence from the Tennessee Association of Museums (TAM). Even though the Association was unable to host their annual conference due to the Covid_19 pandemic, they still handed out awards of Commendation and Excellence in programming, exhibits, and more for museums and historic sites throughout Tennessee.

The Chester Inn Museum's YouTube Channel took home an Award of Excellence in the Audio/Visual/Video Blog category. Launched in 2019, the channel features behind the scenes videos in the museum and highlights

different artifacts. The Chester Inn Museum is currently closed to the public, but we are using the YouTube Channel to bring our collections and Jonesborough's history to audiences around the globe. We have recently launched two, new video series including Social Distancing with the Victorians and At Home Amateur Museum Theatre. Subscribe on YouTube today to see our latest content.

The Heritage Alliance also received an Award of Excellence in the Special Event category for its program "Voices of the Chester." This original play took guests through the Chester Inn where they met and interacted with people from the Inn's past, including original

proprietor Dr. William Chester. The play also shared the stories of Dr. Chester's enslaved woman Dapney, his two indentured orphans, James and Sarah Roberts, former Tennessee Governor Alf Taylor, and many more. The show took place in June of 2019 and school performances were offered September. Two of the stories are featured on the Chester Inn's YouTube page. "Voices of the Chester" was also a runner up for TAM's Past Presidents' Award which is the highest honor conveyed by the Association. The Past Presidents' Award highlights "unique and inspiring exhibits and programs, showing inclusiveness, diversity and pushing boundaries."

Historians at Home: Crowd Sourcing Current History

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, The Heritage Alliance has designed a new program to capture this unique moment in time. Building on our institutional mission to collect, preserve, and share the stories of ordinary people in our region, we have launched a new crowd-sourcing initiative: Historians At Home.

"Historians at Home" is a rapid response project focused on archiving the lived experience of the COVID-19 epidemic. We are asking the public to help us create a collective record of this irregular experience by sharing their own individual stories

We are asking participants to submit a letter, containing their personal stories and points of view, regarding how this pandemic has affected their lives. Whether they are selfquarantining from the couch,


struggling to maintain family or social connections via "social distancing," or facing challenges as they continue working through the crisis, we want to hear it all.

These stories are important because they are personal to each individual, and we want every voice to be represented in our collection for the benefit of generations to come.

Archival Work Provides Opportunities

The Heritage Alliance cannot run without a team of dedicated volunteers. Our most public use of volunteer time is on the frontlines: Chester Inn Museum docents, actors in our museum theatre plays, and town tour guides. But our archives can also provide a lot of work for volunteers with a variety of backgrounds!

We have a large amount of artifacts housed in our archival collection including photographs, objects, and letters. When we receive a new donation, we have to accession and update our collection, and depending on the size of the donation, rearrange the current collection to accommodate a space for it.

The Heritage Alliance archives provides opportunities for volunteers interested in historical artifacts and research in a behind the scenes setting. While it is not as public as docent or tour guide work, it is just as essential to our organization, and can be just as rewarding. Our most recent archival volunteer work has been digitizing our photograph collection.

Our archival work and research is

seen by the public in our museums, and now more than ever online. We rely on our archival collection and photographs for physical and digital exhibits, and continued volunteer interest in the archives allows that to happen!

Our archives may not be open to the public right now, but you can still help from home. We have a multitude of historic letters in need of transcription. If you are interested in historic photographs or artifacts, contact us today about volunteer opportunities!

Volunteer Spotlight: Daniel Nelson

This volunteer spotlight is on Daniel Nelson. Daniel has been volunteering this spring in our archives scanning photographs. Daniel began as a computer engineering student at Northeast State, and is now a second semester junior at ETSU where he changed his major to IT with a computing concentration. We want to thank Daniel for all of his hard work!

Q: How did you find out about volunteer opportunities with the Heritage Alliance?

A: I saw the Heritage Alliance on a list of service organizations. I chose to volunteer here because of your work on history and preservation, and because you seemed to have an impact on the community.

Q: What do you plan to do with your IT degree, and how will your volunteer work help with that?

A: I am interested in enlisting in the Air Force with a plan to focus on cyber security. This position has been helpful because I have been able to learn the Past Perfect system, see how small organizations function and how volunteers help, and this is my first time using this type of scanner.

Q: You've scanned hundreds of photographs. Do you have a favorite?

A: I really enjoyed the Civic Trust photograph collection that showed recent events and town celebrations. I also enjoyed any pictures that captured what daily life was like in the 80s and 90s around and before when I was born. My favorite photograph that I have scanned is the Ostrich Farm in Jacksonville [around 1900]. It was interesting to see how ostriches were used and how people handled them.

Q: Do you have anything that you want to add?

A: I hope to see these photographs online, and possibly made more accessible to the public in the future. I have enjoyed my time working with the Heritage Alliance staff.



Another major milestone in 2020 is the 50th anniversary of the Historic Zoning Commission. This organization has been at the forefront of planning and preserving the architectural history of the area. Many of their early zoning maps and architectural analyses of structures in Jonesborough provided the blueprint for the preservation process.

In conjunction with Historic Zoning, the Jonesborough Civic Trust was also founded 50 years ago. Many of the steps taken towards preserving the history of the area and the face of engaging historic preservation with the public lie with the Civic Trust.

The Civic Trust's activities included organizing events such as the first Jonesborough Days and Storytelling festivals as well as structuring town tours and tours of historic homes. The Civic Trust's practice of tying preservation and history to tourism and the identity of the town is still in place today.

This year the Heritage Alliance will be a cknowledging these anniversaries in a variety of ways including online content and exhibits in our museums. Keep an eye out as we roll these items out this year!

From the Director's Desk, by Anne Mason

Was it just three months ago when I stood before you all at the Annual Meeting and announced our plans for 2020? Geez, it feels like another lifetime now. It was so good to see all your faces that January evening. At that meeting, we shared our goals for the coming year, including two, new fundraisers: the "Dash Through the Past Fun Run/Walk" set for May 30 and the "Taste of Tennessee" cooking event set for August 22. We also received a gracious donation of \$300 from the Wild Women of Jonesborough to help us construct our History Detective Kits and bring our artifacts into classrooms throughout the region.

Then . . . well, we all know what happened next. In addition to being a historian, I'm also a theatre person, and there's a musical called "Songs For a New World" by Jackson Robert Brown. The opening song includes the lyrics, "But then the earthquake hits and the bank closes in. Then you realize you didn't know anything." And that's sort of what I felt like as the Covid 19 pandemic spread across the country. This certainly was not the challenge I was expecting my first year as Executive Director. (We didn't even have pandemics in our disaster manual. but we certainly do now.) Above all, I knew the safety of our staff, members, volunteers, and visitors was paramount, so the Heritage Alliance team has done our best to follow CDC guidelines and adhere to the advice of the State, the County, the Town, and the Tennessee Historical Commission.

It would be easy to mourn all the energy from the Annual Meeting as a

lost cause, but that is so far from the truth. I cannot commend my staff enough for thinking on their feet and coming up with new, exciting content like our Social Distancing with the Victorians web series, our Historians at Home crowd sourcing initiative, and digital exhibits. Every day they inspire me and trill me. And even though we're not interacting face to face, it's rewarding to see the way the public is engaging with our posts and content online. The museum may be closed, but there is history happening now that needs to be preserved and contextualized, so the Heritage Alliance is still here.

Yes, we have had to cancel and postpone some events. We have moved our inaugural "Dash Through the Past Fun Run/Walk" to 2021. We are planning back up plans for the "Taste of Tennessee" and our other programs. The History Detective kits may not be able to roll out into classrooms this spring, but we are posting as much educational content as we possibly can to help students who are learning from home.

Throughout this crisis, I have been buoyed by the good I see around me, neighbor helping neighbor, albeit from a safe distance. As one of my favorite history professors noted on Facebook, "Historians are here to remind you that a future is possible." In studying the epidemics and pandemics of the past, we've seen just how much we've learned from those past crises. The world will look different after Covid 19. We will have learned some valuable lessons, and as in the past, we will use what we've learned to make a better future

In the meantime, the Heritage Alliance hopes you are staying safe and enjoying our online content. We will be participating in Giving Tuesday Now on May 5. We know times are tight for many, but if you are able to or feel so inclined, we'd encourage you to donate to the Heritage Alliance that day. Like many nonprofits, we have had to cancel programs and planned fundraisers. We'll be posting a lot of fun content that day to bring attention to the organization and all we do. And it's very true that even if the museum is closed and no kids are coming to Oak Hill School, our historic buildings still have needs that have to be addressed.

We thank you all for your continued support, and we look forward to the day when we can all gather together again in person. The world looks so very different right now, but as the characters in "Songs For a New World" observe in hindsight, "But you didn't have a clue that the surface sometimes cracks to reveal the tracks to a new world."

Where will these tracks lead us? Who knows what this new world will look like? May we face it together and learn and be stronger for it.
